Heart speaks to heart

'Heart speaks to heart' – that was the theme of Pope Benedict's recent visit to the UK.

I have to admit that prior to his visit I was feeling rather negative about the whole thing. And I was not the only one! There is of course the controversy raised over whether this should have been a state visit at all (costly to us tax payers). Wouldn't it have been better for the Pope to visit on a pastoral basis as did Pope John Paul his predecessor in 1982? Then there is the child sex-abuse scandal and the Vatican's stance on contraception, abortion, gay and women's rights fuelling protests which culminated in a 10,000 strong "Protest the Pope" march in London.

I feared this visit would do nothing to endear Christianity to a secular and sceptical nation nor to open hesitant hearts to receive the love of Christ.

However, Benedict chose his visit to the UK as the moment to express "deep sorrow and shame" over the scandal, confessing it undermined the moral credibility of the church and saying cases should be dealt with as crimes rather than, as he had previously suggested, a matter for the church to handle. He met with victims of abuse and pledged to ensure abusers were brought to justice.

This went some way to softening my negative feelings, but still, as I watched him on TV travelling at snails pace in his Pope-mobile to Hyde Park for the planned prayer vigil – it was like watching paint dry!

But then something happened, my mood changed, and I sat transfixed as I watched the service in Hyde Park unfold and listened to Pope Benedict's words. Words quietly and simply spoken without performance; spoken with truth from the heart. Heart speaks to heart he said, we know in our hearts the love we have for those around us, our friends and families – we know it without words. In the same way we can know the love of God in our hearts even through we cannot fully explain it with words. As he gently spoke the Pope's words reached out to me, touching me deeply – and the 1,000's of people there and no doubt the millions more watching on their TV screens. Heart spoke to heart. Before he took Holy Communion the Pope knelt in silence. Remarkably the silence continued to be broadcast with no commentator's voice 'to plug the gap'.

The silence stretched on, it was an easy silence, the air was filled with prayer. Earlier, after a service in Westminster Abbey, young people had been asked what the best part had been for them. They had said “praying with the Pope in silence”.

Heart spoke to heart in the silence.

‘*Silence is Golden*’ so the song goes. Well perhaps there is real truth in that. So, in the busyness and business of our days can we find space to be silent for a few precious moments. Time to open our hearts to receive God and to give God space to speak to us, in our hearts, in the silence.

Despite all the negativity and controversy surrounding his ‘traditional stance’ on the teachings of his Catholic faith the Pope has brought us all something we can reflect upon and feed upon.

“A wonderful and uplifting occasion” declared one Catholic supporter at the Hyde Park vigil. I cannot but agree with that.

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Bishop's Letter for October

Happy New Year!

The Diocese of Lincoln is a major contributor to educational excellence both locally and nationally. Our Diocesan Board of Education is recognised as a leader in the field, whilst I currently Chair the Church of

England's Education Division and Bishop David is Vice-Chair of the National Society Council.

The National Society was set up 200 years ago as the vehicle whereby the Church could help to provide the best possible education to all children, but especially those from the most deprived backgrounds. What is meant by “best” and “deprived” has changed a great deal over the past two centuries, but the principles undergirding our commitment to primary and secondary education have remained constant.

For some commentators, educational excellence is seen entirely in terms of test results and access to further and higher education. These things do matter, because we want all children to have the chance to achieve well at school, so as to thrive in their chosen profession and place of work. Our Church Schools are about that, but they are about much more besides.

Church of England Schools seek to provide opportunities for staff and pupils to teach and learn in an environment informed by Christian values, celebrating Christian virtues and promoting attitudes and aptitudes consistent with a good life lived for the common good. The word “ethos” is often used to capture what is special about our Church Schools, and although this added value is not unique to schools with C of E in their title, it is something which comes as standard in such schools.

The Coalition Government is committed to creating a new wave of Academies and “free schools”. Whilst offering a robust critique of such proposals when they seem to fall short of the ideals we espouse – especially in relation to schools in deprived areas – we nonetheless stand ready to go on being a force for good in enhancing school experiences and life chances for our children and our children’s children.

At the start of a new school year, we pray God’s blessing on all pupils, teachers, support staff, Governors and Bishop’s Visitors and re-dedicate ourselves to support and encourage them as best we can.

## *Fair Trade*

A group of concerned Christians have worked to make Stamford a Fair Trade Town. This means that the Town Council, local shops and organisations have met certain requirements with regard to fair trading practices. Motivated by this initiative and in keeping with our Christian values the PCC has agreed that Christ Church will use fair trade products. This means that all tea and coffee we use will be fair traded. If you are responsible for the purchase of these items for your group they can be bought at the following locations:

- The Well at Barn Hill Methodist Church on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
- the deli in Silver Lane
- Supermarkets

Fair trade is a concept that as Christians we all need to think about. Not only does it mean that a farmer will get a fair price for his goods, but also the community will benefit, as a small percentage of the price is paid directly to the community who are free to decide how to use the money. Schools have been built, wells dug and roads improved using this social premium. The health and general welfare of the entire population benefits, but the children especially reap the benefits of fair trade.

There are products other than tea and coffee that carry the Fairtrade mark, such as bananas, biscuits, chocolate, wine and clothing. Please consider these alternatives when you are shopping, and help justice to be carried out.

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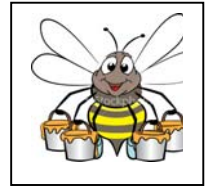
## *October Garden Update*

Though September was not quite an Indian summer it was reasonably mild with plenty of rain at times so I have been able to do quite a bit in the gardens and there have been plenty of insects to observe especially hoverflies, ladybirds and spiders. When the party from Sweden visited Christ Church right at the end of August I took a few interested people on a tour of the church gardens which included the Wild Life Garden at the back of the church.

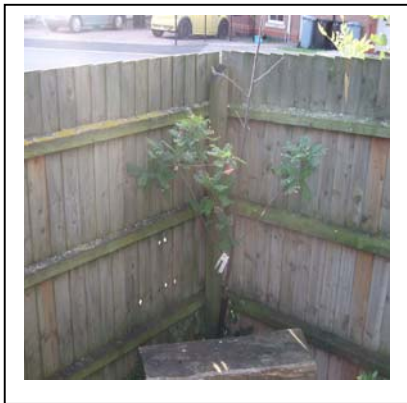
I have managed to cut the grass and next year I hope to see if we can introduce native wild plants to the long strip of grass on the north side of the church to encourage wild life, particularly butterflies, bees, birds, hoverflies etc. It might be stretching it to say I am aiming for a Wild Flower Meadow! but if we could introduce some native wild flowers it would be a

start! This explains why I have left a solitary thistle two thirds of the way down the strip. We now have two hedgehogs in the gardens but the latest one is silver and green – any ideas why?

I have not neglected the other gardens and recently I planted several extra shrubs in the gardens including two variegated Euonymus, a Weigelia, a Chrysanthemum, a Sedum, two Verbena Bonariensis, two small Goldcrest fir trees and three different cotoneasters! Each time I did some planting it rained soon after, and once it rained whilst I was in the middle of planting!! Hopefully the rain will have helped them to become established. The rain also followed me when I planted a variety of climbers, with wooden trellises behind for them to scramble up, on the east wooden fence of the Garden of Dreams and they should provide a colourful background through most of the year.



To the right of these climbers in the south east corner of the Garden of Dreams behind the wooden corner seat stands the Rowan tree which is growing well and was full of berries in September. The berries are an unusual pink colour rather than the usual dark red! I am sure that the Archbishop of Canterbury would be delighted! (You will no doubt remember that he made a special visit to see the Rowan tree in the Garden of Dreams after lunch when he came to Christ Church last March!)

Recently I planted over 200 bulbs in the gardens including daffodils, narcissi, some rather snazzy tulips, crocus, snake's head fritillary, alliums- both Purple Sensation & Christophi, anemones, and some unusual crocus. I planted some of the daffodils and narcissi in the grass in front of the wooden fence to the Garden of Dreams so that they are naturalised and should be visible when you look across the car park.
